

From the Principal

By our renewed commitment to prayer, fasting and almsgiving (acts of charity), we reestablish God as #1. Dear People of Palma,

Lent is here — the season of repentance, change, and rededication to the spiritual life for each of us individually and collectively. We take these 40 days of Lent to venture into our own metaphorical "deserts," where we discipline ourselves in an effort to rearrange our priorities. By our renewed commitment to prayer, fasting and almsgiving (acts of charity), we reestablish God as #1. This is the process of *metanoia*, the Greek word of the gospels, meaning a total and spiritual conversion or awakening — a fundamental and repentant change of character. Perhaps you will consider attending our Lenten Mass Series at 7:00pm in the Blessed Edmund Rice Chapel here on campus on Wednesdays during Lent? Lent is also a good time for some personal "spring cleaning" of the most important kind!

May I suggest that in the spirit of Lent, we share our appreciation for *community* here at Palma? The concept of community is central to a thriving school environment. Forgive me for not properly citing the theologian who impacted me with his teaching on community many moons ago in college, but his insights merit some recollection here. "Community," he said, "cannot be *created* as some would have it today. *Community already is*," he continued. "Our reality of existence at a specific time and place among many peoples already presupposes a context for community. What kind of community we are can be celebrated when we are conscious of our need for one another, when we are fully aware of the richness of our diversity, and when we commit to be united in common purpose. Community is fully realized then, when we celebrate moments in our lives with full participation in the source of all life in God…who is, at once, one Being and three persons, and the very essence and definition of community. This is why festivities like birthdays, graduations, anniversaries and other milestone celebrations are important human experiences. They are so, not just because they require community, but also because they are opportunities to express the joys of life — celebrations thusly which are distinctly Christian."

In celebration of community at Palma School, I encourage you to celebrate with us in our annual St. Patrick's Luncheon on Wednesday, March 13th. We ask for your help in making this event happen. We need your sons to participate also, and so we permit them a day off of classes to do so. Far more important, however, I urge you to *join* us for lunch in Br. Dunne Hall that day. Take time to be truly present here on campus. Enjoy a delicious meal and some terrific Palma fellowship. Take joy in the presence of Palma fully present to our community beyond in so many ways over the decades. A flyer is enclosed with details to pre-purchase your order(s). Please, join us!

CSF California scholarship Federation



CSF stands for the California Scholarship Federation, whose mission is to recognize and encourage academic achievement and community service among high school students in California. There are approximately 1500 chapters throughout the state, and each chapter is composed of students who meet CSF eligibility requirements. Eligible students become members by submitting applications based on their report card grades. Membership is for one semester, and membership drives are held twice each year within established periods dictated by CSF bylaws.

The list below includes high school students who not only had fall 2023 semester grades and behavior records that qualified them to apply for membership but who also met the mandatory deadline for submitting an application. Students must reapply each semester they are eligible; the next application period will be in September based on the current semester's grades.

Character The student of good character is cooperative; demonstrates high standards of honesty and reliability; shows courtesy, concern, and respect for others; and generally maintains a clean disciplinary record.



Spring is a great time to make college visits.

Ready for a college road trip?

Well, consider visiting colleges during Easter break or this summer. If you're just beginning the college search process, start your visits close to home. Even if you don't plan on attending a local college, visits to nearby institutions will allow you to more carefully focus on such factors as size, diversity of student body, type of institution, majors and courses of study. Visit both public and private colleges, residential and commuter campuses, universities and liberal arts colleges. Once you've determined the characteristics most important to you, you can begin visiting colleges that are further away. Seniors who have begun receiving admissions decisions may want to pay a second (or third) visit to each campus they are seriously considering. This is the time to go beyond the group tour. If possible, arrange an overnight visit with a stay in the dorms. Attend classes and talk with students about what they like and don't like. Eat at the dining hall, and check out the library. Picture yourself attending that school and determine where on your list that college falls.

Southern California college trip

The Palma guidance department had another successful college trip to eight different universities. Thirty-nine students and three chaperones began their journey at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo and ended at University of San Diego. We visited two CSU's, two UC's and four private universities. Several of our tours were led by Palma alumni. Most of our guides attended the college trip themselves when they were sophomores and juniors at Palma. This trip truly reinforces that our alumni are Chieftains for life and that the Palma brotherhood is alive and strong. All juniors will take the ACT with Writing on March 26

No need to register your junior to take the ACT this year. Palma will be offering the full ACT on Tuesday, March 26th to all juniors. This test will count as one of their college tests. It is not a practice test. Parents will receive an invoice in the amount of \$53.00 for the ACT exam in March. There will be a special schedule that day for all students during the testing day. If you have any questions, please contact your son's counselor. The ACT will conclude around noon. Students with extra time will conclude around 1:30pm.

College blogs provide an insider's view

In an attempt to forge a greater connection with prospective applicants, admission offices across the U.S. are recruiting students to write blogs about their college experience. Although these officially sanctioned (but uncensored) blogs can sound a bit like a promotional tool, they often do provide a real insider's view of life at that institution. Happily, bloggers are likely to tell you about the good and the bad. Ideally, the reader will come away with an idea of what makes that college unique and interesting. Blogs put a very human face on the institutional facade. At some schools these students receive a small stipend, while at others they are volunteers. But are they really helpful? At MIT, the admissions website gets 15,000 page views a day. A recent MIT survey of admitted students revealed that blogs were among the three most useful things in helping students to decide to attend.

2024 SUMMER SCHOOL COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

ALGEBRA 1 REVIEW

Credits: 5 (High School or Junior High)

Reviews numbers and basic arithmetic operations applied to them and proceeds through solving systems of equations and inequalities, polynomials and algebraic fractions by applying various algebraic axioms, concepts and methods. For those who failed or did poorly in Algebra I or those who wish to improve their math skills before entering school in the fall.

BIOLOGY REVIEW

Credits: 5 (High School)

This course reviews the study of energy flow, plant and animal classification, microorganisms/aspects of cell theory, biochemistry, heredity and genetics, and evolution. Designed for students who failed or received a low grade in one or both semesters of Biology.

FRESHMAN/SOPHOMORE ENGLISH REVIEW (ENG 9 & 10)

Credits: 5 (High School)

Review of college preparatory freshman and sophomore English composition and literature - specifically, of Palma's required summer reading texts. Designed for Palma students who have failed or received a low grade in English I or II and for those who need "extra help" with their summer reading or with English skills.

FUNDAMENTALS OF SPANISH

This course is for enrichment only; not for credit – 2.5 hrs for 5 weeks

This course introduces students to the Spanish language and prepares incoming students who will be taking Spanish 1 at Palma. The instructor will review the fundamentals of Spanish such as numbers, sentence structure, alphabet, and verb conjugations.

GEOMETRY (HONORS)

Credits: Honors: 10

An intensive course to present the principles of geometry covered at Palma. This honors course is designed primarily for Palma students who wish to advance to Algebra II Trigonometry during the coming school year. This course is ONLY open to current 10th graders or above.

JHS ENGLISH/LITERATURE REVIEW (JUNIOR HIGH)

Credits: 5 (Junior High)

Reviews the principles of English composition and literature covered in the seventh and eighth grade at Palma Junior High. Primarily designed for Palma Junior High students who have failed or received a low grade in English and for those who need "extra help" with their summer reading or with English skills.

JUNIOR/SENIOR ENGLISH REVIEW (ENG 11 & 12)

Credits: 5 (High School)

Review of college preparatory junior and senior English composition and literature - specifically of Palma's required summer reading texts. Designed for Palma students who have failed or received a low grade in English III or IV and for those who need "extra help" with their summer reading or with English skills.

MATH 7 (JUNIOR HIGH)

Credits: 5 (Junior High)

This course reviews the principles of general math covered in the seventh and eighth grade at Palma Junior High. Primarily designed for Palma Junior High students who have failed or received a low grade in General Math or those who wish to improve their math skills before entering school in the Fall.

PRE-ALGEBRA

Credits: 5 (High School or Junior High)

Review of the principles of pre-algebra covered at Palma. Primarily designed for Palma students who have failed or received a low grade in Pre-Algebra or those who wish to improve their math skills before entering school in the fall.

RELIGIOUS STUDIES REVIEW

Credits: 5 (High School or Junior High)

Independent study by contract to make up Religious course or credit shortages in required subjects. Enrollment is restricted to Palma students. The students will meet once each week, by appointment, with the instructor.

SPANISH 1, 2 OR 3 REVIEW

Credits: 5 (High School or Junior High)

This course is to review the principles of college preparatory Spanish 1, 2 or 3 covered at Palma. Designed for Palma students who have failed or received a low grade in Spanish 1, 2 or 3; or those who wish to improve their language skills before entering school in the fall.
