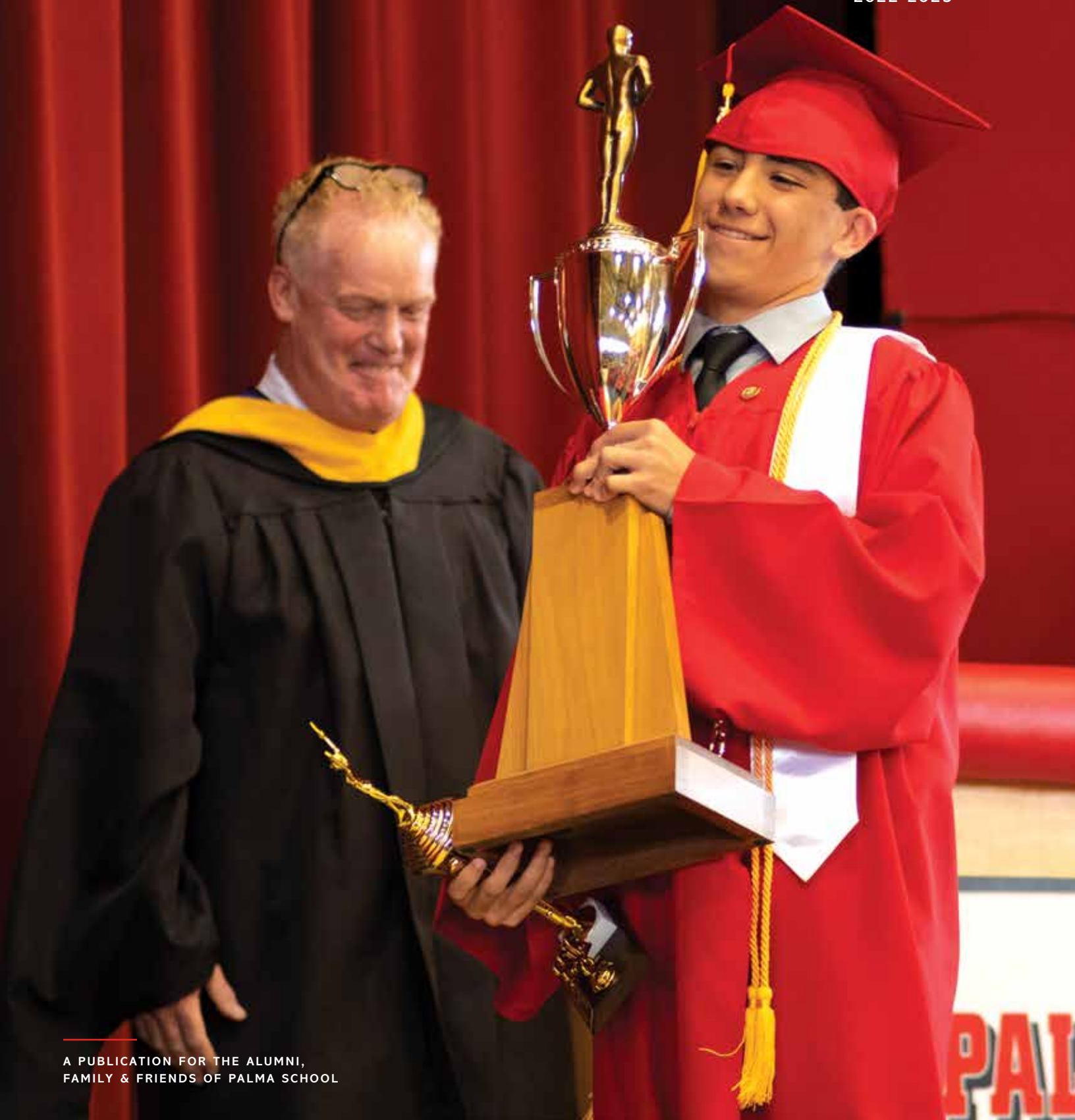

Principal



Chieftains' Varsity Football teams have earned a playoff berth 39 years in a row and have been Division Champions 17 out of 23 seasons under Jeff Carnazzo '85.

The Winningest Football Coach

“I believe that we’re in the business, not for winning football games, but for building men.”



There is already a lot to brag about when it comes to Palma football. And now you can add one more boast to the bunch: Palma’s Jeff Carnazzo ’85 is the winningest high school football coach in Monterey County history.

Carnazzo staked his claim to the number-one spot on October 28, 2022 when the Chieftains defeated the Santa Cruz Cardinals 38-3; the 201st win of his career. Just the week prior in the 24-21 win over the Aptos Mariners, Carnazzo tied his former coach (both on the field and sideline), the late Norm Costa.

Jeff Carnazzo was born and raised in Monterey. He hadn’t even heard of Palma when his dad told him he was coming here for seventh grade. He was disappointed to be leaving his friends, but in no time was enjoying everything Palma had to offer, eventually lettering in baseball and football. By graduation, he was eager to go to college, but knew he was going to miss this place.

Carnazzo graduated with a Bachelor’s Degree from CSU Fresno. He returned to Palma in 1990 and while teaching U.S. History and coaching JV football, earned his Master’s in Education and a teaching credential. In 2000 he moved up to Head Coach of the varsity football team.

In the classroom, Carnazzo confesses, “I coach U.S. History, I don’t teach it.” He uses the same passion at the podium as he does on the field and his students can feel it and usually respond in kind. But, make no mistake — his first love is coaching football.

“I believe that we are in the business, not for winning football games, but for building men. We do win football games, but I believe that my players, once they’ve completed four years in our program, are going to be men.”

A big part of teaching boys to become men is teaching them to be GOOD men. “When we win, we want to win with integrity. And if we lose, we want to lose with integrity. We put a premium on sportsmanship in this program.”

The football program benefits from a campus culture of brotherhood. Teachers and coaches talk about it and students “get” it. It makes solid teammates who push hard when the going gets tough. It also makes it easier for student-athletes to buy in to the three pillars of the program — accountability, selflessness and toughness (both mental and physical). These are concepts students learn as freshmen and are reinforced throughout their time here. “I hear from college coaches all the time about how much they love our players because they work hard year ’round and understand how to grind.”

Carnazzo’s personal goal — more important than bringing a state championship to Palma — is to leave a legacy of building men. ●

Returning to build a home and hope

Mission Mexico

During their Easter vacation, April 10-15, Palma students, staff and chaperones were busy in Mexico building a house for a family in need.

Mission Mexico was brought to Palma in 2002 by Willie Beesley '86 and Dennis Donahue '72. The program was taken over in 2004 by George Garibay. It is a unique opportunity to build a house while building character and self-confidence. Students receive hands-on training in most phases of construction. Experienced staff members and chaperones accompany the group and Palma is well known to the parish that is our host and advocate. Safety is a top priority while in the country of Mexico and during construction.

This year, 11 students and five adults made the trek. For the Chieftains involved in the program, the learning opportunities are tremendous. Not only can they be part of a team that literally builds a house from the ground up, but they also have a chance to experience another country's culture first-hand. The disparity in living



conditions between the Salinas area and the Mexican border towns is stark and impactful for students.

More than building a house, Chieftains have built a home and created a new opportunity for a deserving family in Mexico. This mission has been cited as one of the most powerful experiences a young man can have during his high school years at Palma. ●

What we did on your summer vacation:

Campus Maintenance

After 72 years of continual use, the facilities original to the campus could use a little attention.



As stewards of the donated revenue entrusted to us as an administration, we cannot always devote money to projects that are shiny. There comes a time when infrastructure needs attention. With speculative plans and capital improvements in mind and on paper, updating worn out systems will not only serve our current students, but make future plans easier to accomplish.

Number one on the list of maintenance is new roofs. The roofs over the original structures — all four classroom wings and the front offices — are being replaced, ensuring the elements stay outside for a couple of decades to come. Water lines that have served the campus for seven decades are also being replaced.

Perhaps the most visible improvements will be the demolition and replacing of the bathrooms located in A and D wings. These improvements will make the bathrooms more efficient, ADA compliant and a lot nicer to occupy. The bathrooms in B and C wings are scheduled to be remodeled next summer.

A new “Palma Basketball” logo has been designed and will be in place on the gym floor in time for school to begin in August.



Other future improvements slated for the campus are updated security cameras and fencing. These are the result of a recent grant. The date for these projects is being determined. ●

Rosary Garden

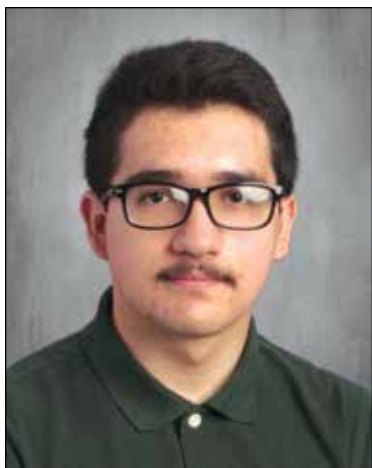
Mr. Silva’s sixth grade class, with help from Tobias Perkowski ’24 and Roberto De León ’24, completed a Rosary Garden. The project was entirely student driven with plants propagated from stem cuttings and grown on campus. Students prepared the site and did all the planting. The mulch was free from a tree service and the cross was donated by a Palma supporter. There are only four different species planted on the ground plane representing the four Mysteries of the Rosary. Plants are in multiples of ten, referencing the decades of the Rosary. One lighter colored succulent is positioned where our Lord’s head would have been as he hung and died for our sins. The Rosary Garden is behind A Wing next to the Blessed Edmund Rice Chapel patio. ●

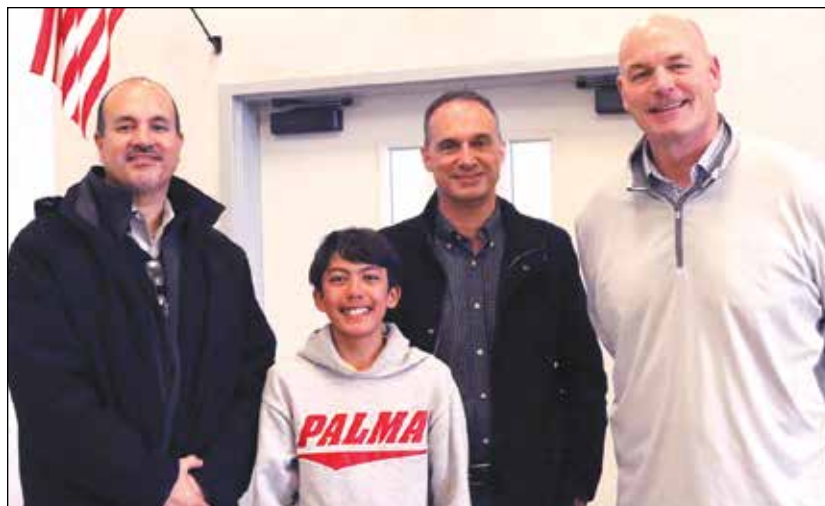

Palma was awarded a plaque for placing third overall. Carmel won the championship round while Stevenson was the runner-up. In total, there were eight schools competing, ranking in this order: Carmel, Stevenson, Palma, Pacific Grove, Catalina, Rancho San Juan, Salinas, and Gonzales.

Football

Palma's football team finished the season with a 6-1 league, 8-3 overall record earning them the Gabilan Division Co-Champions title. The team was led by JC Escutia '23, Owen Sargenti '23, Logan Saldate '24 and Thomas Nunes '24. Other notable contributors were Jose Escutia '23 and Joe Silacci '23. Despite the loss of some key seniors, next year's team looks promising. In addition to Nunes and Saldate (who just signed a letter of intent to Oregon State University), look for Tommy Ducker '24 and Drew Molinari '24 to play big roles in next year's campaign.

Cross Country

Coach Victor Plata is working hard to rebuild the Cross Country team, which had no seniors on it this year. The hopeful striders were led by Wells Lilly '25. Noa Kawamoto '24 set a school course record of 22 minutes and 36 seconds at the Palo Corona meet.

Water Polo had a young team playing in a very competitive division which led to a challenging season. Of the 15 players on the team, there were only four upper classmen (two seniors and two juniors).

Basketball

After back-to-back Gabilan Division Basketball titles, this year's hoopsters finished in fourth place, but still qualified for CCS. Charlie Kosta '23 led the charge, along with notable contributions from Logan Guerini '23, Robert Galli '23, and Matt Fuqua '23. They advanced to the championship game in the annual Lucille & Luis Scattini Tournament but were edged out by Whitney High School. The team will retain some talented players and is poised for a good run in 2024.

Soccer

Soccer ended their season in fourth place with a 7-7-6 record after being elevated to the more challenging Mission Division. The team was headed by two all-league selections, Jaylin Mariscal '23 and Suyesh Niraula '23. Aiden Contreras '26 was named all-league goalkeeper. Two other all-league players to watch are sophomores Sebastian Sanchez and Giovanni Gutierrez. Palma soccer is another young team that has exciting potential for the future.



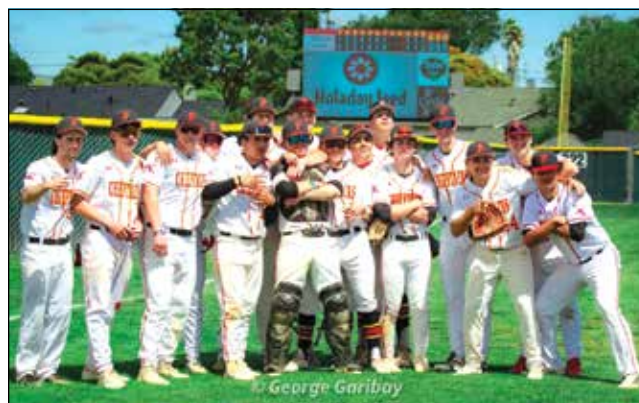
Wrestling



Isaiah Jimenez '08 and his coaching staff brought home Palma's first division title in Wrestling with a 4-1 record sending six grapplers to CCS. JC Escutia '23 finished in first place, JoJo Andrade '23 and Ethan Gonzalez '24 took second, and Isaiah Rangel '25 finished third. All four qualified for the state meet in Bakersfield. Wrestling honorable mention goes to Henry Cremers '23. JC Escutia earned a wrestling scholarship from Menlo College and JoJo Andrade earned a wrestling scholarship from Simpson University.

Baseball

Baseball qualified for a playoff berth with a fourth place 17-10 record. The Gabilan division went 5-1 in the first round of CCS playoffs and Palma defeated Salinas in the semi-finals, but wound up second in CCS Division IV. Quentin Williams '23 and Nate Cruz '23 led the pitching squad. Jayden Kim '23 has been the starting catcher for two years and a driving force of the team. Kaleb Shannon '24 led the team in hitting. Overall, their success this season came from a total team effort.



Golf

The 2023 golf team was loaded with talent but plagued with injuries resulting in a fourth-place finish in league. The team was led by Gabe Herbst '23 with the overall lowest scoring average in the league, Palma's lone CCS qualifier and named to the all-league team. Evan Russo '23 and Kevin Chen '23 both earned golf scholarships from Menlo College. Brendan Watson '23 held Palma's lowest tournament scoring average. Ryan Russo '25 is the only veteran returning next year.



Lacrosse

John Sutherland '18, in his first year as head coach, led the team to an 11-3 record and a PCAL League Championship in the Mission Division. The team was anchored by goalie Sal Cina '23 and League MVP attack Tommy Ducker '24. Additional outstanding play came from Thomas Nunes '24, Hunter Acosta '24, Ryan Guerra '24 and Caleb Romero '24. The future looks bright for Palma Lacrosse.

Swimming

First year head coach Dominic Hernandez suffered only one loss in dual meets tying the Chieftains for first place in the regular season. They finished third at the league championships. Jacob Regalado '24, Isaac Kelly '24 and Henry Vetter '26 all turned in outstanding performances.

Tennis

After being decimated by COVID, the team continued to rebuild, getting to six players this season which enabled them to compete. Will Conners '23 was a force in singles play and Kai Kawamoto '24 and Luke Secondo '26 were tough in doubles.

Volleyball

The volleyball team had only one senior, Anthony Secondo. The remainder of the squad were sophomores and freshmen. Setter Ben Dalton '25, outside hitter Isaac Torres-Diaz '24 and middle blocker Miles Holaday '25 all played well. There will be a good number of returning athletes next year.



California Wrestling Hall of Fame

Simon Jimenez, long-time Palma wrestling coach, was inducted into the California Wrestling Hall of Fame in December. He has coached at Palma since 2000 with numerous accolades to his credit. Sam Stoutenborough '18 transferred to TCU to play ball for the Frogs while working on his master's after completing a BA in American Studies at UC Berkeley.



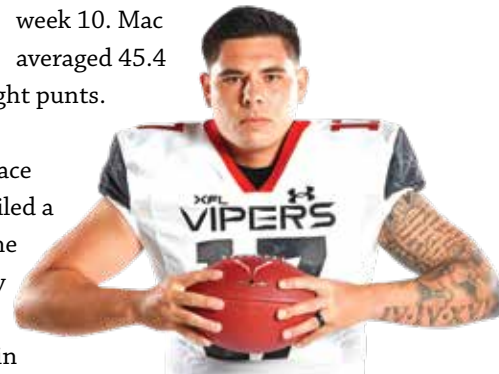
